#### LAST-MINUTE QUERIES

I am seeking information on my gr-grandfather, James R. Pollock, and his wife, Serena Barkhurst. They were married at Elm Springs, Ark. on Dec. 1, 1859. During the Civil Var he served as a private in F Co., 10th Regt Texas Inf. After the war he returned to Elm Springs, where he had a small business and served for a time as postmaster. About 1875 he moved his family to Denver, Colo., where he resided until his death in 1922. According to 1870 census (Elm Springs Tunshp, Lashington Co., Ark.) he was born in Arkansas (abt. 1836) and his wife was born in Missouri (abt. 1844). I would like very much to obtain their exact places of birth and their parents' names.

I am enclosing data relating to the Cumberland Presbyterians who pioneered the Cane Hill area of Washington Co., Ark., particularly the Pyeatts, Buchanans, Hanks, Morrows, Moores and other. Were the Lawsons and Campbells found there in the 1870 census and were they the same Lawsons and Campbells who moved later into Oklahoma, around Westville, Watts and Nowata? Is there a published list of early Washington Co. marriages, wills, deeds, and cemetery inscriptions. Can I purchase copy of such listings if they have been made? Another question: Were the Harmons and Reinharts and Nathan D. Hanks originally from the old Tryon, Lincoln Co. area of N.C.? My husband and children are descendants of some of the pioneer CP citizens of Vashington Co., Ark. Would appreciate knowing of any published material.

It is believed that they lived in Searcy, Ark. and that they moved to Texas about 1860. I need proof of this and also need the date and place of her birth. I had an interesting experience as the result of a Query last month. I answered it and after much correspondence have learned that we are almost kinfolks. Anyway I am able to answer her questions so far. I do not have much time to do research but I accomplish a little as time moves on from day to day.

#### POPE COUNTY MEMORIES

Norristown, what little I know about it. My grandfather, Jos. N. Marshall, came to Norristown, Ark., about 1832 from Williamson Co., Tenn. My father was born March 9, 1836 on the old Jesse Howell farm about halfway between Norristown and Russellville. At that date Russwillville had not started, so he was born in Norristown and was buried in Russellville, less than 2 miles of where he was born, on Nov. 9, 1895.

In the early part of 1900 we kids used to roam all over Norristown Mountain. One day we came across an old tree that had grown up close to a rock bluff. The tree had blown down. Up: on the bluff about 15 ft was a hole about 5 inches in diameter, plugged with lead. We didn't have any way to get to it, so we soon forgot it. But I still wonder what was behind that lead plug.

My sister who is 83 years old remembers going with my mother to visit a family by the name of Brearly. She was young and remembers only a few houses there but she says that the river did wash away part of the town of Norristown.

In 1846 Capt. David West formed a company at Dover. On this roster are the names of Wm. Marshall 20, I.H.M. Marshall 18, W. W. Whittle 20, John Whittle 17, William Stout 40. On Jan. 13, 1848 W.W.Whittle married Elizabeth N. Marshall (by William Stout).

In 1853 the Marshall family left Russellville in a wagon train for the gold fields of California. For some reason the train split up. Part went on and part came back. Grandpa Marshall, Wm. and W.W.Whittle his wife Elizabeth, settled in Castle Rock, Wash., where they are all buried. The rest of the family - Grandmother, father and his two sisters, came back to Russellville. One of the girls married a Dr.Gordon and the other married a Dr.Kirkland.

My mother was born in Tuscumbia, Ala. in 1845. The Dunn family came to Norristown about 1853, with three negro slaves. I see in the marriage records of that time some names I remember. One in 1870 was Ruffin Dunn and Frances Ware. That was the negro boy of the slaves of Grandpa Dunn.

Now about Cadron. I have a brother who lives about 6 miles out of Conway. His farm is about 2 miles down the river from the ferry. It runs 3/4 mile along the river. On his farm is an old graveyard. Ohly a few of the 125 graves have markers with inscriptions. Most are rough sandstone markers. One marker, broken and lying on the ground, had this name on it -- James H. Martin, born March 23, 1796; died Feb. 25, 1826. J. Tunnah of Little Rock was the maker of the marker. On one plot is the Castleberry family where seven were buried in one week. This cemetery is on a low hill 200 yards from the river. Around this hill was the old emigrant road. The ruts had washed out a gully 8 or 10 feet deep and had cut into some graves. This is back of my brothers farm some 300 or 400 yards.

I wish some one would put in print some of the history of other old towns so they won't be completely forgotten. I am working on my family history. Now I have something to work on and some names to write to, thanks to you.

## THE WASHBURN FAMILY Ancestry of Edna Simmons Campbell (Mother's side)

(Editor's note: The Arkansas Family Historian takes pride in presenting this history of the lashburn family in England and America, written by a direct descendant. Mrs. Campbell has also sent us material about other branches of the Washburns, including Benjamin Mills Washburn of Alabama (Boyd, Thompson, Shackelford, Crist); Julius F. Washburn of Vermont; William Micou Washburn of Louisiana; and Cephas Washburn, who, with his son, Edward P. Washburn, attained fame in Arkansas.

The surname Washburn is identical with Washbourne and Washborn, and the family derived its name from two small villages in England. The word itself is from two Saxon words -- Wash, meaning the swift-moving current of a stream, and burn or bourne, a brook or small stream. The authentic history of the family begins before the adoption of surnames.

- (I) Sir Roger de Washborn is the first known authentic ancestor of this family. He is mentioned in an Inquisition of 1259 and in the Lay Subsidy Roll of 1280. He was living in 1299. His wife's name was Joan. His son and heir was Sir John.
- (II) Sir John de Washborn, son of Sir Roger de Vashborn, was known during his father's life as John de Dufford from the name of his estate, as his father was known from the Washborn estate. After his father's death he became Sir John de Washborn, and is mentioned in the Lay Subsidy Roll of 1280. In 1316 he confirmed to Roger, his son and heir, and Margaret, his wife, all his manor of Washbourne. He died before Michaelmas 1319. Sir John's wife Isabella is thought to have been of the Casey family.
- (III) Sir Roger (2) de Washbourne, son of Sir John de Washborn, married Margaret \_\_\_\_\_ as early as 1316. He had the property of Washborne and Stanford, and his name is on the rolls of birthplaces in 1327 and on other records dated 1346, 1349, 1353 and 1358. Sir Roger died after 1358. He had two sons named John.
- (IV) John (2) Washborn, younger son of Sir Roger (2) de Washbourne, succeeded to the estates as heir of his older brother of the same name John Washborn. This custom of giving the same name to two sons was not uncommon down to the 17th century. His wife's name was Isabelle.
- (V) Peter Washburn, son of John (2) Washburn, married in 1355, Isolde, daughter of Thomas Hanley. They had sons, John and William.
- (VI) John (3) Washburn, son of Peter Washburn, was a distinguished man, He held various offices of trust and honor; was on the commissions of the peace for Worcestershire of 1404 and 1406. John Washburn married (1st) Jane, daughter of Sir John and Katherin (Thromwin) Washborn) Musard. Her mother was the widow of John Washborn, elder son of Sr. Roger. He married (2nd) Margert Poher (Powre). The only child of his first wife was Isolde. Children by his second wife were: Norman, mentioned below, John and Elinor.

- (VII) Norman Washborn, son of John (3) Washburn, was involved in litigation with Humphrey Salwey, who had Stanford through his mother, half-sister (Isolde) of Norman. Salwey claimed Little Washbourne and Norman Washborn claimed Stanford. John Washborn also had the Wichenford property that came to him through his grandmother, heiress of the Pohers, and for ten generations Wichenford was the home of the family. Norman Washborn married Elizabeth Knivton. He died before 1479. His children were: John, mentioned below; Eleanor who married (1st) Sir Richard Scrope and (2nd) Sir John Wyndham; Anne who married Thomas Gower; Elizabeth who married Nicholas Folyotte.
- (VIII) John (4) Washborn, son and heir of Norman Washborn, was born as early as 1454. His name appears among the commissioners appointed under acts for raising subsidies of the year, 1496-97, 1513-1515. He died May 6, 1517. He married (1st) Joan, daughter of William Mittom, Lord of Weston. He married (2nd) Elizabeth Monington. Children of John by his first wife were: Robert, through whose son John the elder male line continues in England; John, mentioned below; Walter, Francis, Children by the 2nd wife were: Anthony and Richard.
- (IX) John (5) Washbourne, son of John (4) Washborn, settled at Bengeworth, a few miles from Little Washbourne, probably at the time of his father's death in 1517. His will is dated Dec. 27, 1546. He was buried Jan. 8, 1548. He married Emma who was buried May 13, 1547. Their children were: John, mentioned below; William who died 1588; Katherine who married Daniel Hyde; Alice who married Robert Marten.
- (X) John (6) Washbourne, son of John (5) Washbourne, died intestate in 1593 and was buried Oct. 13. He married (1st) Apr. 21, 1542, Jane Busell (Bushell?), buried Apr. 4, 1557. He married (2nd) May 8, 1561, Jane Whitehead who was buried Apr. 23, 1567. He may have had a third wife, mother of the three youngest children. Children: Margaret 1543; Johanne 1544; Agnes 1547; Villiam 1556; Radegonne 1579; Dniel 1582; Mary, baptized Dec. 7, 1584.
- (XI) John (7) Washbourne, son of John (6) Washbourne, was perhaps the unnamed son baptized Aug. 1, 1566. He married July 6, 1596, Martha Stevens, who died in 1625-26. He will was dated Sept. 29, 1625 and proved May 9, 1626. His will was dated Aug. 4, 1624 and the inventory dated Dec. 11, 1624. He was then an old man, and as stated in his will, was unable to sign his name on account of blindness, authorizing his "Brother John Tymbrall" to sign for him. Children: John, mentioned below; Jane, baptized Dec. 2, 1599; William, Nov. 9, 1601; Jane, baptized Apr. 11, 1604 and buried in 1636.
- (XII) John (8) Washburn, son of John (7) Washbourne was THE IMMI-CRANT ANCESTOR. He was baptized July 2, 1597 and settled in Duxbury, Massachusetts Bay Colony, and with his two sons, John and Philip, was able to bear arms in 1643 (Indian Wars). He and his son John were among the original 54 persons who became proprietors of Bridgewater, Mass. They bought the lands of the old sachem, Massasoit, for seven coats of  $1\frac{1}{2}$  yards each, nine hatchets, eight hoes, twenty knives, four moose skins, and  $10\frac{1}{2}$  yards of cotton cloth. The transfer was signed by Miles Standish, Samuel Nash and Constant Southworth. He married Margery More. Their children were: John, mentioned below; Philips, born in England 1624; probably others.

- (XIII) John(9) Vashburn, son of John (8) Washburn, was born in England in 1621 and came to this country with his parents. He married, in 1645, Eliza, daughter of Experience Mitchell. John Washburn sold in 1670 the house and land given him by his father, at Green Harbor, Duxbury. His will was dated 1686. His children were: John; Thomas; Joseph mentioned below; Samuel born 1651; Jonathan; Benjamin; Mary born 1661; Elizabeth; Jane; James born 1672; and Sarah. (See Mayflower Descendants Book of Volume II, 1906, printed Jan. 26, 1920).
- (XIV) Joseph Washburn, son of John (9) Washburn, married Hannah, daughter of Robert Latham and his wife Susannah (Winslow) Latham. He resided in Plymouth and Plympton, Mass. His children were: Joseph, mentioned below; Jonathan; Ebenezer; Miles; Ephraim, Edward: Benjamin; and Hannah.
- (XV) Joseph (2) Yashburn, son of Joseph (1) Washburn, was born about 1700. His wife was Hannah Johnson. His children were: Elyah, Joseph; Seth, mentioned below; and Ebenezer.
- (XVI) Colonel Seth (1) Washburn, son of Joseph (2) Washburn, was born 1723 and died Feb. 20, 1794. He married (1st) in 1750 Mary Harwood and (2nd) in 1788 to a widow, Sarah (Denny) Sargent, Widow of Thomas Sargent. Colonel Seth was a leading citizen of Leicester, Mass. holding many offices and was prominent during the Revolutionary War, having served as Colonel in that war. (See the writer's DAR papers on file in National DAR office). His children were: Seth(2), born in 1751; married Susannah Rood; Joseph born in 1753, married Ruth Davis: Asa, mentioned below; Mary born in 1759, married Samuel Sargent; Hannah born in 1762; Sarah born in 1764; Amity born in 1766, married John Hayward; Lucy born 1769; Elizabeth born in 1774.
- (XVII) Asa (1) Washburn, son of Colonel Seth Washburn, was born in Leicester, Mass. in 1757 and died Oct. 6, 1834. He is buried in East Putney Cemetery, Putney, Vermont. He was a soldier in the Revolutionary War from Leicester in 1780-81 in Capt. Mathew Chambers' Company and also in 1782 in the Sixth Company. After 1783 he removed to Putney, Vermont where he became a leading citizen and magistrate. He married Sarah Upham of Spencer, Vt. His children were: Judge Reuben Washburn born in 1781 in Bridgewater, a very prominent man; Levi born in 1763; James; Seth (3) who lived in Randolph; Jacob who lived in Chelsea; Asa born 1791 lived in Putney, Vt. (This last the ancestor of the writer.)

(Note: All above record is authenticated and recorded by William Richard Cutter, historian of the New England Historic Genealogical Society, Newton, Mass., in his book New England Families published in 1914. This record was also checked by Mrs. George Gassett, East Putney, Vt., professional genealogist, in 1951. Mrs. Gassett is the historian of the town of Putney and compiles and records records of citizens of the town.)

(XVIII) Asa Washburn Jr., son of Asa Washburn (1) and his wife, Sally Upham Pashburn, was born in Putney, Vt. Dec. 3, 1791. He married Eunice Wellington. The Town Records of Putney give the following births to Asa and Eunice Lashburn:

Henry Licium Mar. 13, 1835 "

The Congregational Church Records of Futney, Vt. show that Asa Washburn Jr and Mrs. Eunice Washburn joined the church Feb. 19, 1832.

Asa Washburn's first wife, Eunice Wellington, died in Liberty, Miss., Oct. 16, 1854 at the age of 63. She was born in 1781. She undoubtedly was visiting her daughters, Mary Jane (who married (1) Hugh McGehee who lived only six months after marriage and (2) John Martin Covington who lived in Liberty, Miss. at the time (and who was the grandfather of Edna Simmons Campbell). Or she may have been visiting the Shirks in Liberty. The Reverend Shirk married two sisters of Mary Jane and the Shirks comed and operated the old Seminary there in Liberty.

Asa Washburn Jr married (2nd) Ruth Harkness Sept.11, 1855. We think by then they were too old to have children. On Dec. 7, 1856, Asa and his second wife took out a letter from the Congregational Church of Putney, Vt. to one in Winchester, New Hampshire. Records of the Congregational Church of Winchester, N.H., show that Asa and his wife joined that church in January 1857.

On the tomb of A sa Washburn buried in the Evergreen Cemetery in Winchester, N.H., are these words:

"Asa Washburn died Feb. 28, 1872, 80 years old Eunice Wellington, his wife, died at Liberty, Miss. Oct. 16, 1854 and 63 years old."


According to the Futney Town land records, on March 31, 1857, Asa Washburn sold 130 acres of land for \$1,200 and at that time gave his address as Winchester, New Hampshire.

The Roster of War of 1812-1814, page 439, by Herbert T. Johnson, Adjut General of Vermont, gives the following information:

"Asa Washburn, Corporal, Putney, served in Capt. Parson's Company, Colonel Jonathan Williams' Regiment, Detached Militia in U.S. Service 2 months and 13 days, 1812. Pension Contificate No.9922. Pension Certificate of RUTH, No.16989."

(NIA) Mary Jane Washburn, daughter of Asa (2) Washburn Jr, was born in Putney, Vermont March 17, 1826. Her mother was Eunice Wellington Washburn. The marriage of her sister Elizabeth Sarah to Milton S. Shirk who was born in Ohio Nov. 27, 1818, influenced Mary Jane's whole life. Milton Shirk attended school at Oxford and Granville in Ohio, and later entered Madison University (now Colgate University) at Hamilton, N.Y.) where he graduated from both the literary and theological departments. He was converted at age of 17, uniting with the church at Oxford, Ohio, where his father, Elder Joseph Shirk, was pastor. He met and married Elizabeth Sarah Washburn and they moved south to Mississippi to live. He united with the Preston Baptist Church in Yalabusha Co., Miss., and was licensed to preach. He was ordained in 1846 during a meeting of the State Baptist Convention at Columbus, Miss.

In 1853 Mr. Shirk established the Amite County Female Seminary at Liberty, Amite Co., Miss. Milton Shirk and his wife Elizabeth Sarah were teachers in the Seminary. Mary Jane and her sister Hannah Emeline (known always to our family as "Aunt Emma Shirk") came south with

their mother Eunice Wellington Washburn about 1853 or 1854 to visit the Shirks. The mother died while on this visit. The old Seminary building was standing in 1962.

Soon after Mary Jane Washburn arrived in Liberty, Miss., she met and married Hugh McGehee. He died just six months after the marriage of typhoid fever. There were no children by this marriage. After her husband's death, Mary helped with the teaching in the Seminary. While there she met and married John Martin Covington (marriage record in Amite Co., Miss. Vol. V) who had come down from Warren Co., Kentucky and opened a drug store in Liberty. They were married May 15, 1856.
Mary Jane and John Martin Covington had five children. They were:

John J. Covington
Charlie Covington
Emma Covington
Mattie Covington
Elizabeth Covington (our mother)

John Martin Covington, born in Richmond Co., N.C. in 1817, died Oct. 9, 1864 and is buried at Liberty, Miss. During the Civil War the Union soldiers took every thing he had left Mary Jane and her children except what they could take into one room of their house. The fact that Mary Jane was a Yankee prompted the Union soldiers to give her the opportunity of taking her children and what she could into this one room while they occupied the rest of the house. She was not molested after that. (Elizabeth Simmons, our mother, remembered this experience very well and told it many times to her children.)

After the Civil War the Shirks re-opened the Seminary. Elizabeth Shirk, Mary Jane Covington and "Emma" Washburn were close together, all assisting "Uncle Shirk" (as called by our mother) with the teaching in the Seminary. In 1871, while in Shreveport, Ia., Elizabeth Shirk died and was buried there, but in 1872 her body was moved to Liberty (Miss.) Cemetery where it is at this writing. No doubt, Uncle Shirk and Elizabeth were on an evangelistic trip when she died.

Uncle Shirk then married Hannah Emeline (Aunt Emma) Washburn, sister to his first wife and of our grandmother, Mary Jane Washburn. Aunt Emma died in 1886 and is buried in the cemetery at Osyka, Miss. where they had moved from Liberty. Then in 1888 Uncle Shirk married a third time, to Mary J. Jessee. Uncle Shirk died Oct. 31, 1898 and is buried in the Osyka, Pike Co., Miss. cemetery. His third wife is also buried there.

(Note: The Shirk account is given here because this family was so intimately connected with our mother, Elizabeth Covington Simmons. Our mother and father were married in Uncle Shirk's home by him. Our mother looked upon him as almost a father, since her own father died when she was only two.)

A fter the death of Mr.Covington, Mary Jane Washburn McGehee Covington married a Mr. Gordon, widower with three children: Annie, Mae and Charlie. For a time, the two families lived at Keatchie, La. near Shreveport. Mr.Gordon died there.

Mary Jane's son, John J. Covington, was an engineer on the Texas & Pacific Railroad and was killed in a train wreck. He and his wife Bess lived in Gretna, Ia. Mary Jane's son Charlie lived in Marshall, Texas. He was the first of the children to die. Mary Jane's daughter Emma married Sam Flanagan who was Postmaster at Shreveport, Ia., where they lived. Mary Jane's daughter Mattie married Jimmie Tate and they lived on what is now known as the "Tate Place" at old Simmonsville in Pike

(XX) Mary Jane's youngest daughter Elizabeth (our mother) married William Eli Simmons, son of George Washington Simmons, planter of old Simmonsville, Pike Co., Miss. George Washington Simmons died Jan. 2. 1872, having been wounded in the Civil Var when William was 13 years old. William Eli and Elizabeth went to live with William Eli's mother who, with William Eli and his older brother George W. Jr. and a large group of tenants, had operated the more than 2,000 acre plantation left in the Simmons Estate.

After Mr. Gordon's death, Mary Jane, his widow and our grandmother, lived with her daughters. She died in Shreveport, La. April 21, 1901, while visiting her daughter Emma, and was buried in Longview, Texas.

(Note: The story of the Elizabeth Covington Simmons family appears in full in the published book, "The Silver Creek Simmons Family", so will not be repeated here.)

## A NOTE ON SOME ARKANSAS WASHBURNS

Several of our members who are working on the Washburn line will be grateful for Mrs. Campbell's contribution to the Washburn history. The Rev. Cephas Washburn of Vermont came to Arkansas in 1820 and founded Dwight Mission in Pope County. Twenty years later, Cephas Washburn came to northwest Arkansas where he preached and taught school. In 1845 he secured a charter from the state for FarWest Seminary at Mt. Comfort. The unfinished Seminary building was destroyed by fire. It was later completed by Rev. Robert Mecklin who operated the school as Ozark Institute for 20 years, until the state university at Fayetteville put it out of business.

The story of Washburn's educational adventures in Washington County is told in "Early Colleges and Academies", published by the Washington County Historical Society. This booklet also contains an account of the painting of the "Arkansas Traveler" by Cephas Washburn's son, Edw. Payson Washburn. Another son of Cephas Washburn was J.W.Washbourne (note the spelling) who married Susan Ridge and lived in Fayetteville some 20 years after the killing of her father in 1839 in the Cherokee Nation. J.W. Washbourne and his wife are buried in the Polson Cemetery, just across the Oklahoma line north of Maysville, Ark.

The Washington County Historical Society will publish in its next FLASHBACK ( January 1964 ) the deeds whereby J.W.Washbourne sold the Ridge properties in uptown Fayetteville. This was where the Ridges lived and where the teacher of the Ridges, Sophia Sawyer, founded the Female Seminary. This early school (1839) was followed by Arkansas College (1850), the state's first school to grant academic degrees. It was the fore-runner of the state university (1871).

The Washburns' origin was in Vermont. But all three attained fame in Arkansas. -- WJL

#### Salem Death and Burial Register, No. 56

Catherine Stockburger, maiden name Christman, was born Nov. 25, 1751 near Yorktown, Pa. She came with her widowed father to the Reedy Fork of Haw River, North Carolina; and she moved to Salem, N.C. in the fall of 1770. In 1772 she married the single Brother, George Stockburger, and moved with him to his farm. She died Dec. 6, 1788 in Salem, N.C.

#### Arrivals noted in the first Wachovia Register, page 58

Jan. 30, 1766, John George Stockburger arrived in Bethabara, N.C., coming from Europe, via Charleston, S.C.

### Salem Death and Burial Register, No. 133

Johann George Stockburger, a widower, his age 72 years, 6 mos. and 19 da. He was born Feb. 2, 1731 in Kirnach, Wurtenburg. He married, March 1, 1772, in Salem, the single Sister, Catharina Christman, who fell asleep Dec. 6, 1788 in Salem. He fell asleep Aug. 21, 1803. They had five children:

#### The Stockburger Family of the United States

In 1766 a company of brethren directed by the Board of the Unity (Unity of Brethren, commonly called the Moravian Church) came from Europe to Bethabara, North Carolina, by way of Salem, N.C., Jan. 30, 1766. In this group of brethren there was one German, John George Stockburger, who was born in Kirnach, Furtemburg, Germany, Feb.2, 1731. His age was 34 years, 11 months and 28 days.

After arriving in Bethabara, N.C., John George Stockburger and another brother of the Unity were asked to take charge of farms and cattle, partly for their own support and partly for the assistance of families in the town of Salem. Stockburger notified the conference that he was willing to take charge of the plantation but would rather keep his own position until August. The conference did not think it wise but would rather he would settle now.

His marriage came into the question. Several Sisters came into consideration and at last Catherina Christman was the one to be suggested to Brother Stockburger. " If he approves, then Sister Catherina Christman must be told. If she accepts, then George Schmidt must be notified".

On Feb. 25, 1772 Brother Stockburger's betrothal was announced, the wedding to take place March 1, 1772, Brother Tiersch officiating. The betrothal was announced three times after preaching in the morning of March 1, 1772. At 3 o'clock p.m., the communicants assembled and in their presence Brother John George Stockburger was married to Sister Catherina Christman. First the wedding choir sang the wedding Doxology, then the blessing of the Church was laid upon this pair, uniting them in Holy Wedlock. Brother Tiersch was the officiating minister. This was the first wedding in Salem, N.C. Brother Stockburger came to the wedding from Bethabara in a wagon. Monday they went to Bethabara. On March 23, Brother and Sister Stockburger took charge of some of the fields and meadows in and around Salem, N.C.

- 1. Johann Jacob Stockburger born in Salem, NC July 7,1775; died Mar. 19, 1792, age 16 yrs 8 mos. Probably died of smallpox. "All the little girls and all the little boys except Johann Stockburger, have fully recovered from smallpox." (From Diary of the Moravians, Salem.)
- 2. John Stockburger, born Nov. 13, 1777 in Salem, N.C., married Sara Leinbach, born Feb. 8, 1779 who was the daughter of Joseph and Anna Maria Leinbach. John and Sara were married Mar. 1, 1803 in Salem, N.C. They lived near Bethania. John was a farmer and cooper. The children of John and Sara were:

Sarah Louisa Stockburger, youngest daughter of John and Sara Leinback Stockburger, born Feb. 13, 1824, married Peter Phillip Fetter who was born Jan. 5, 1816 near Hope, N.C. They were married Sept.16, 1841. His widowed mother was still living in Bethania.

John Stockburger fell asleep Feb. 19, 1825 and is buried in Bethania, N.C. Sara Leinbach Stockburger fell asleep Dec.11, 1868 and is buried in the Moravian Cemetery ("City of the Equal Dead") in Winston-Salem.

- 3. Elisabeth Christina Stockburger born in Salem Sept. 6, 1781, fell asleep Mar. 7, 1862. She also is buried in the Moravian Cemetery in Linston-Salem, N.C. June 4, 1793, the older girls celebrated their choir festival. Two children were received into the choir, Elisabeth Stockburger and Anna Maria, daughter of the negro Brother Samuel and his wife Bethabara.
- 4. Johanna Justina Stockburger born in Salem Feb. 20, 1784 and fell asleep Nov. 3, 1877, age 80 years 6 months 19 days. We know that she was noted for her handwork, as some of her paintings are still in the possession of the present generation (1960).

5. Joseph Stockburger was born in Salem May 10, 1786. Married Anna Elisabeth Schulz born Dec. 2, 1783. To this union three children were born:

Maria Salome, born Feb. 17, 1811 Malinda Elisabeth, born Nov. 30, 1816 Lauretta Sybella, born Aug. 26, 1822

"In the speaking before the Single Sisters Covenant Day, Sister Anna Elisabeth Schulz stated that Joseph Stockburger withed to marry her and that she was not opposed to the proposal. Only that she did not wish to forfeit membership in the Unity through this step. If this marriage takes place and is properly conducted, and in the future she continues to act as a Sister, the Conference does not object. She may be considered a received member of Bethania Congregation."

"The single sister Anna Elisabeth Schulz was married to the single Joseph Stockburger who does not belong to us. The marriage was performed by our Justice of Peace, Br. John Christian Leoch."

Joseph Stockburger died March 20, 1856, His wife, Anna Elisabeth, died April 11, 1861.

#### Cohutta, Georgia, Stockburgers

The first generation to leave Winston-Salem, N.C. was Jacob Stockburger. Jacob, born Mar. 7, 1804, was the oldest son of John and Sara Leinbach Stockburger of Bethania, N.C. Jacob married Nancy E. Davis, daughter of Adam and Winney Davis. Nancy was born May 18, 1807; died Dec. 23, 1891. She is buried in Mt.Olivia Cemetery, Cohutta, Ga.

Jacob Stockburger came with his family to the Cherokee Purchase in northern Georgia in 1841. He settled on a farm near Cohutta. Here the family lived until the death of both Jacob and Nancy Stockburger. The farm is now owned by Edward Stockburger, grandson of Jacob.

Of this generation, Lydia Anna and Nancy lived at Cohutta, Ga. until their deaths. Lydia was postmistress at Cohutta. Nancy made her home with Lydia Anna. Neither was ever married. Lydia died Jan. 19, 1916. Nancy died Apr. 14, 1917. Both are buried at Cohutta, Ga.

Winnaford Stockburger married Alex Reed and died near Bolivar, Mo. Jacob Elisha Stockburger was a merchant and farmer at Oglesby, Texas

where he lived until his death, Feb. 22, 1924. Buried at Oglesby.

Joseph Stockburger lived at Chattanooga, Tenn. He died Jan. 7, 1889 and is buried at Mt.Olivia Cemetery, Cohutta, Ga.

Edward Stockburger lived on the old home place at Cohutta for some time but in later life moved to a farm near Varnell, Ga. where he died in 1932. He is buried in Mt.Olivia Cemetery at Cohutta, Ga.

#### West Fork, Arkansas, Stockburgers

John Calvin Stockburger, b Jan. 26, 1829 in Stokes Co., N.C. He came to Cohutta, Ga. with his parents when he was about 12 years old. He married Martha Ann Reed, daughter of Robert and Elisabeth (Fagala) Reed who were of Pennsylvania Dutch descent. Martha Ann Reed was born near Knoxville, Tenn., Apr. 4, 1828.

In 1852 they came to northwest Arkansas, to where the town of West Fork is located. They homesteaded land some three miles east of the present site of West Fork. He built a double log house on the mountain near a spring but his other lands lay in the "bottom" along the West Fork of White River. One of the outstanding attractions of the homestead was the spring, which furnished water that was uncontaminated by malaria mosquitoes. This spring was probably 200 or 300 feet down a rocky hillside below the house. The water was drawn up by a windlass to the spring-house at the top of the hill, from which it was carried by bucket to the kitchen or the "wash-place" near the spring-house.

At this home, Calvin and Martha reared their family, all of whom were born there except Alex and Nancy who were born in Cohutta, Ga. After their children were married and gone from the home, John Calvin and Martha Ann moved to the town of West Fork where they lived until their deaths. Both are buried in the Baptist Ford Cemetery, which is about 5 miles south of Fayetteville, Ark., by the Baptist Ford Community Church.





MARTHA REED STOCKBURGER

The Immigrant Ancestor of the Arkansas Stockburgers was John George Stockburger who was born 1731 in Wurtemburg, Germany and arrived in North Carolina on January 30, 1766. His grandson, Jacob Stockburger, moved to Cohutta, Georgia in 1841. He married Nancy Davis. They had eleven children. Their oldest son was John Calvin Stockburger, born 1829, who married Martha Ann Reed, born 1828 in Tennessee. They moved to West Fork, Washington County, Arkansas, in 1852. The story of the Stockburgers appears on pages 19 to 23 of this issue of the Arkansas Family Historian. Compilers of the history are Iva Stockburger and Bertha Stockburger Woodruff of Fayetteville. My grandmother, Precia Prince Langston, was born in Union County, S.C., in the year 1825(?), and died Nov. 15, 1910. She is buried at Rehoboth Cemetery in Phillips County, Ark. Precia Prince Langston's parents were Joseph and Milly Barnet Putman Prince. Mill's first husband was A bel Putman. They were the parents of two sons, Zadek and Basil. My father said, "I never saw them but I have heard my mother speak of her half-brothers." In the 1850 census of South Carolina, Zadek is listed as 45, his wife Hannah 35, their daughter Jane Wick 11. There is a deed record in Union County where Zadek and Basil sold land left them by their father, to Joseph Prince after he married their mother.

Milly's father was Isaac Barnet and her mother's name was Elizabeth. In Isac's will the names of the children were not given, only there were seven. I have not been able to find out very much about Milly's brothers and sisters. One brother, Marshall Barnet, had a daughter named Milly who married Rob Ray. Noah Barnet married Irena Johnson, a sister of Nancy Johnson Prince, wife of Gist Prince, the youngest brother of Precia Prince Langston. brother of Precia Prince Langston.

According to the 1850 census, Milly Prince was born 1784 and died in June 1864. She is buried at Padgett's Creek Cemetery. Joseph Prince was born between 1770 and 1780, according to the 1840 census of South Carolina. This census listed only the name of the head of the family. Joseph was in the age bracket, 70 to 80. He died April 11, 1842 and is buried at Padgett's Creek Cemetery.

Joseph and Milly Prince were the parents of eight children, three sons and five daughters: Darius, Malinda, Elizabeth, Samuel, Marcha Patsy, Le Precia, Lucinda (Lucy) and Gist.

I. Darius Prince was born in Union Co., S.C. in 1810. He married a widow, Mrs. Jane Greer. Her children were: Sarah Jo, Hampton and Calob Greer. Children of Darius and Jane Greer Prince were: Victoria, born. in 1839, married Bill Short, lived in Sardis, Miss.; Endora, born in 1843, never married, and died when a very young lady.

Darius was a prosperous farmer, with land and slaves. He sold his part of the Prince estate to his brothers, Samuel and Gist Prince, before the Civil War and moved to Mississippi. This story was told to me by my father. Darius sent an old slave, "Uncle Jasper", to his mothers farm to help make a living while the men were at war. The following lads were too young to enlist: Cory and Thomas Courtney Langstonand Rhett, Napoleon and Collins Prince, sons of Gist Prince. All the boys were first cousins and lived in the home of their grandmother. Willy Prince. These boys were to help with the farm work and do exactly what "Uncle Jasper" told them to do. According to Dad, they did not do much work, but they had a lot of fun. The mark of the state of the

II. Malinda Prince, their second child, was born in April 1820 or 1821. She married William Martin Hollum about 1840 or 1841. He was born March 18, 1820 and died in March 1883. He was the first person to be buried in Rehoboth Cemetery, Phillips Co., Ark. Almost 21 years later, Sept. 4, 1904, Malinda was laid to rest beside her husband. Both were born in South Carolina.

This story about Aunt Linda Hollum happened when I was a small child. On May 26, 1893, our family stood on the front porch and watched the worst storm I have ever seen. It was a tornado that passed about three miles to the south of our home. It was just at this time that little Willie May Bonner put in her appearance at the home of Mr. and Mrs. William Bonner. She was known for miles around as the "cyclone baby." As soon as the skies cleared, my father said "I had better ride down towards the church to see if any one needs help." Aunt Linda\*s home was on the edge of the tornado but was not seriously damaged.

This is the story of a brave young officer, William Demoret, who lost his life in World War II. This account was given by his sister, Mary Louise Demoret:

"William Demoret entered the Service in the summer of 1943 and received his commission as Second Lieutenant in 1944. He went overseas in January 1945 and was killed on May 6, 1945. He was awarded the Bronze Star, Purple Heart, and Silver Star.

"He was killed while making contact with the Russian forces. He was in the mechanized cavalry, and his tank was set on fire. All the men got back except one man. My brother went to look for him. This boy had been confused as to direction but returned soon after my brother left. Later the Sergeant found my brother with six S.A. Snipers. Three of them were dead, and my brother was dead. He was buried in Kaslerdorf, Austria. After the war was over, his body was brought home and buried in Maple Hill Cemetery, Helena, Ark., Dec. 18, 1948.

"As a memorial to William and three of his chums from Elaine, who made the supreme sacrifica for their country, our family made a park in Elaine and landscaped it with shrubs and flowers. Near the center stands a tall granite marker, with bronze plates on the four sides on which is inscribed the name of each boy and record of his service."

- IV. Samuel Prince, b in S.C. in 1821, according to census of 1850. He was a planter and his income was listed at \$1,500. He moved to Dallas, Texas before 1860 and died there during the Civil Mar.
- V. Martha Patsy Prince, b in S.C. in 1823; d abt 1873 and is bur in Cypress Valley Cemetery, near Rondo, Ark. The cemetery is lost.
  - VI. Precia Prince, b in 1825; m LeRoy Langston abt 1850 in Union Co., S.C. Children: C.L. and Thomas Courtney. There is a complete account under the Langston line.
  - VII. <u>Lucy Prince</u>, b abt 1833; d July 10, 1909 and is bur in Rehoboth Cemetery. Lucy and Patsy lived with their mother, Milly Prince, until her death in June 1866. For a time they lived with the family of their brother Gist Prince. They came to Ark in January 1871. This story has been handed down in our family, that Lucy was engaged to be married and her lover was killed in the Civil War and no one could take his place. As I remember Aunt Lucy, she was kind and thoughtful of others, especially of the members of the family. She loved her nephews very, for they had cared for her for more than 40 years. After I left Grandmother's home, we had long talks on many subjects. She said to me many times, "Zora, I hope that you will never get married." She was never bitter. Perhaps she thought it would be nice for me to take her place as the old maid of the family.
    - VIII. Gist Prince, b 1827, m Nancy Johnson; d in May 1862 while serving in the Confederate Army in Va. This record of his death was given me by Bernice Prince Dieckmann of Union, S.C. She is a granddaughter.

These facts, she said, are copied from a letter that she received from A.S.Sally, State Historian, Columbia, S.C. "The official muster rolls of Co. C, 18th Regt., Inf., S.C. Vols. show that Gist Prince enlisted there as a private under Capt. T.W. Malone in Marion Dist. Dec. 13, 1861. He is reported on the muster roll for Apr. 30, 1862, as on furlough, sick. His name does not appear on any later muster roll of the company. On a roster of the company compiled from memory by the survivors about 20 years later, it is stated that he died of disease in Richmond, Va."

His body was brought home, in a wagon. This was in May, only a few weeks before my father was born, and Grandmother herself was unable to go. so Miss Polly Sparks offered to go and bring the body home. He was buried in Padgett's Creek Cemetery. Later the U.D.C. placed a marker at his grave. At that time only two people were living who had attended his funeral and the exact spot of the grave could not be located, so the family requested that the marker be placed by the side of the grave of his youngest son, James Gist Prince. ## Rehoboth Cemetery, Phillips Co., Ark.

(Editor's note: Since many members of the Prince and related families are buried in Rehoboth and Cypress Valley cemeteries, we asked Mrs. Atkinson to locate these burial grounds for us. She answered: "Hehoboth is located in phillips County, about a mile from the line between Lee and Phillips. It is in Township 1 South, Range 2 East. It is about two miles southwest of Rondo, Ark. Rehoboth Cemetery is still in use. The Cypress Valley church was located about 1 miles northeast of Rondo. There was both a church and cemetery there but this site has been lost. #### THE BOGGS FAMILY CEMETERY

Listed Feb. 17, 1962 by Mr. and Mrs. Leister E. Presley, 1708 W Center, Searcy, Ark.

Near the Clay community in White Co., Ark., and about  $\frac{1}{4}$  mile west of the SE corner of Section 29, Township 9 North, Range 7 West, there are signs of an old house place. This was the home built by Robert Israel Boggs soon after he married Jennie Whisnant, Nov. 12, 1867 in White Co., Ark. About 300 yards north across a meadow and at the edge of the woods is a rock pen about 30 by 40 feet and about  $3\frac{1}{2}$  feet high. Inside the fence are eleven graves.

- 1. Charles Edward Boggs (unmarked born 1876 died Dec. 1884. Second child of Robert Israel Boggs and Jennie Whisnant Boggs. When he died the creeks were in flood and it would have been very difficult to reach Mt.Pisgah where the Boggs family were buried, so this place was chosen and a family cemetery started.
- 2. John Wesley Boggs (unmarked) born July 7, 1888 died 1894. Sixth child of Robert Israel Boggs and Jennie Whisnant Boggs. Other children of Robert I and Jennie W. Boggs:

Smith Boggs of Miss, John W. Boggs was born in 1815 and attended school in Yorktown, S.C. He went to Miss. in 1840 and married Catherine J. Smith, daughter of John and Martha Smith, in 1841. In 1853 they moved from near Oxford, Miss. to White Co., Ark., because of the land available here. He was opposed to slavery and especially the increase of mulattoes on his neighbor's plantation. He was not a minister but was a very religious man and helped organize churches in his community and neighboring communities in White Co. After the death of his wife, he went to Texas with part of the children. lived near Cleburne, Texas. Two rooms of the old Boggs log home are still standing, about 3-4 mile from Highway 16 on the Clay Road. Other children of John W. Boggs and Catherine J. Smith Boggs were: Mandy Boggs; Joseph W.Boggs; James P.Boggs - Nov.10, 1844 - Jan. 21, 1915; Newton J. Boggs; John Boggs; Mary Frances Boggs; Lucy Boggs; Sarah Boggs; Franklin L. Boggs; George Boggs; Charley W. Boggs; Martha Boggs; Addie Boggs; Harrison B. Boggs.

- 8. (Unmarked) W. Hodge Lytal, husband of Jo Emma Boggs Lytal. They were married Nov. 11, 1887 in White Co., Ark. Other children were: O. Gibbon Lytal and Gertrude Lytal. Jo Emma Boggs was the only child of Joseph W. Boggs and Martha J. Majors Boggs who were married Feb. 15, 1866. She was niece of #4 above.

It is amazing to me how many people there are who think that, because I happen to be married to a man named Carter, I can tell them all there is to know about Carters all over the U.S. I don't like to think of the Carter name as being common but, after all, it is not so rare that all its holders are bound to be kin. But there may be those who would be interested in my husband's branch of it and Ishall gladly share what information I have.

Charles Carter of Essex Co., Va., was in the Revolutionary War and was in the battle of Monmouth. After serving three years he was honorably discharged and went back to Essex Co. In 1782 he moved to Chesterfield Co., Va. and lived there until 1810 when he moved to Cumberland Co., Ky. The descendants of one of his sons, Thomas, are still living on the old home place in Kentucky. Another son, Samuel, who had moved to Ky. before his father, in 1805, had a son named David Carter who became a doctor. David Carter moved to Daviess Co., Ind. some time before 1841 and bought land near Plainville, built a house and little office for his practice, and helped to found the community of Epsom. His son, Dr. David Ray Carter, continued his practice and used the same little office building which is still standing. (Miss Alice Carter, my husband's aunt, still lives on the place and I believe that the office is now used as a utility room.) One of Dr. David Ray Carters sons, Austin, moved to Texas about 1912, and in 1922 he moved again, to Mena, Ark. He and his wife, Ethel Hulen, had three sons, the oldest being David Ralph. Rupert, the second son, was killed in a train wreck in Cuba about 1937. Carl, the youngest, was lost at sea during World War II.

Though I had haunted old cemeteries in Indiana and searched court records and the Carter family Bible, I had not gleaned much information on this family until Dr. Harlan Wilson, a dentist of South B end, decided to go Carter hunting. Finding no one else in the family who had collected anything, he began to bombard me with questions and tell me the results of his findings. I am indebted to him for the proof that Charles Carter, the Revolutionary soldier, was the father of our Samuel Carter, for information on the Kentucky Carters which I shall gladly share (the outline of the descendants of Thomas Carter is too long to print here), and for some dates and other information which I would not have had, if he had not made several trips to Virginia and to Kentucky. The outline, as we have it, is as follows:

I need help in finding the place of birth and par-HOLMSLEY entage of Burl J. Holmsley. He is listed in census of 1840 and 1850 in Richland Twnshp, Madison Co., Ark. I have checked available local histories. Goodspeed's history of northwest ark. does mention John Holmsley and his son Stephen, as well as a James Holmsley but no mention of Burl. Burl J. Holmsley married Lucinda Wagnon in 1831, I believe, in Washington Co., and their son Thomas J. Holmsley was born in Washington Co. in 1835. In 1852 Burl J. Holmsley left Richland Twnshp and took his family to Texas. He listed his birthplace as Ky. in the census of 1850 and 1860, and his sons listed his birthplace as Mo in the 1880 census. I find no Holmsleys listed in the 1810 Ky. census and other early Ky & Mo censuses are missing. Nor are there any Holmsleys listed in 1790 census although John Holmsley listed his and his wife Mary's birthplace as Va in 1773 and 1778 respectively, in the 1850 census of Richland Twashp, Madison Co., Ark. I would be interested in any information that could shed light on Burl J. Holmsleys parentage.

I am trying to find out if my Martin Randleman, a RANDLEMAN Revolutionary War vet, died in Washington Co., Ark. I've been told that his grave was marked by Marion Chapter, DAR, of Fayetteville. Martin is shown on an 1804 tax list of Livingston Co., Ky. Martin Randleman came to Ill. in 1801 and settled in St. Clair Co. (His land is present site of Milstadt.) My gr-gr-grandfather was born in Ill. in June 1803, next to the youngest of Martin's five sons: John, Henry, Jacob, (Michael 1803), Martin Jr. 1810, and a dau. Polly who married David Reese.

Martin Randleman Sr qualified for a Pension before the Clerk in St. Clair Co., Ill. in 1831-32. I have his pension papers. His veteran's payments were transferred from Ill. to the Ark Agency Mar.4, 1836. He recd money at Little Rock, Ark. (\$13.33) which was due him from Mar. 4 to Sept. 4, 1841. He was living in Washington Co. at time of payment. No mention of his death date or the name of a widow in the National A rchives. I have my gr-grandfather Henry in several census records, on each of which he shows Ark as his place of birth (1850-1880). I havent been able to locate time or place of his parents marriage -- Michael Randleman to Jane Lemmens. Jane Lemmens had a brother Jason Lemons, b 1809 in Ky, and sister Maribah (Maribee Leming) b 1815-16. Jane her self was b in NC 1805. They were orphanced abt 1822.

Anything you can tell me would be appreciated. I have about 1,200 of Martin Randleman's descendants and almost as many puzzling mysteries to solve.

CARRIGER I am compiling record of the Carriger family, from whom I am descended. A Carriger settled in Fayetteville, Ark. prior to Sept 1888. This Carriger had several children: James Henry, b about 1857; David; Leonard (both these two died at War Eagle, Ark. prior to 1931; dau. Louisa Carriger who married an Ed Shockley; two other daughters, names unknown; & sons John & Green.

James Henry Carriger is reported as having been in Fayetteville Ark, as he had one son born there, a Simon Henry Carriger, from whom I obtained such data as I have. James Henry Carriger and family left Ark for Texas about 75 years ago.

Anyone with the name spelled CARRIGER is related, as my second gr-grandfather had the name officially changed from Kercher to Carriger during his 30-year term in the Tenn. legislature. The Carrigers were a large family and every generation moved farther from Tenn.2nd gr-grand father was the youngest in his family, all of whom had adopted the spelling of CARRIGER long before it became official. The family was originally from Germany, and settled in Penn. in 1739. The name was spelled however it sounded to whoever might be writing it down -- Kercher, Karcher, Kaercher, Carger, Carder, Karriger, etc., prior to removal from Tenn. in 1780.

Whatever assistance you may be able to give me will be appreciated. It is only through the kind help of others that I have attempted this vast undertaking.

I am trying to trace my lineage for the D.A.R. BURNETT Mrs. Anna Harrington of 8086 Mission Blvd, Riverside 12, Calif has sent me the name of Mr.A.Monroe Jackson, a cousin of hers. His address is PO Box 319, Berryville, Ark. He is 87 years old and knows all of the pioneers there. Mrs. Harrington says in her letter to me:

"We too have burnetts on the Jackson family tree. A Cornelius S.Burnett came to Ark from Cody, Ky. some time after 1870 bringing some of his family with him. He died in 1880 and is bur. in "Rock Springs Cemetery. One son married Telitha Jackson but deserted her. She later married my husband's father. His name was Cornelius Burnett; he went to Okla., remarried, died at Durant, Okla. His brother, Charles Richard, born in Cody, Ky., married one of Thomas Jackson's girls and they raised a large family. Now there are many Burnetts over in the Osage area and they show on the census for 1850-1880. It could be your Patty family was related to them since they came into Ark from Tenn and Va. I asked my husband about Patty's Gap but he did not know the name. However, someone in the Carroll Co (Ark) Historical Society may know. My husband was born on Trigger Mtn, now called Pension Hill."

#### IDAHO GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY

One of the better genealogical periodicals that reaches our desk is the Idaho Genealogical Society Quarterly. Idaho has the state divided into seven "chartered chapters", all of which tentribute news to the state quarterly. Headquarters of the Idaho society are at 610 North Julia Davis Drive, Boise, Idaho.

The Idaho Quarterly makes fascinating reading. For example, the September issue under "Owyhee County Gleaning" contains a record of deaths and burials in that county which was compiled by Mrs. Wilma Lewis Statham from old newspaper accounts. Read these:

Mar. 25, 1867 - Wm. Younger, a stage driver, killed by Indians.

June 5, 1878 - Fletcher Hawes, killed by Indians at Big Springs.

Apr. 15, 1885 - W.F. Jones, suicide by hanging in John Turner's barn.

Oct. 1894 - Wm. Hayes, "Badman from Texas", illed by Tap Duncan

Oct. 1894 - Tap Duncan, "Badman from Arkansas", killed by Wm. Hayes

May 26, 1900 - Asher Jessee, killed in explosion in Dewey Mine Tunnel

Jan. 21, 1903 - D.W. Stemple, lineman, died from exposure in blizzard.

June 15, 1878 - George McCutchan, stage, driver, killed by Indians.

Aug. 13, 1887 - at Baxterville, Ben Potter thrown from bucking horse.

May 1892 - Roy Duncan, drowned in Owyhee River

May 1892 - Albert Corpe, drowned while in search of Duncan's body.

Apr. 15, 1887 - Frank A. Brainard died at Pleasant Valley, Idahob,

age 49. Buried at Hot Springs, Ark.

Most of the accidental deaths of the 1860s were "by Indians" or by drowning. In the 1870s and 1880s many of the deaths were the result of "mine accidents", and if you need a "punch line" for your history, here it is:

May 1866 - 95 Chinamen killed by Indians near the mouth of Jordan Creek. There were only 5 survivors. Bones gathered and shipped to China in Sept. 1872.

Thanks to the Idaho Genealogical Society for introducing us to the history of that area. We can't match the romance of Idaho's pioneer history but we intend to investigate Tap Duncah, known in Idaho as the "Badman from Arkansas."

## NEWTON CO., MISSOURI, RECORDS

I read your fine publication each time an issue comes. For some time I have been preparing to publish various kinds of records of my home county (Newton of Missouri), Judging from the queries in your "Family Historian", my records could be of aid. For example, Witherspoon, Billingsley, Blair, etc. Your readers may be interested in my compilation of Cumberland Presbyterian records from Neosho, Mo., beginning 1838.

A large number of the Winns of northwest Arkansas are undoubtedly descendants of Minor Winn the First, of Virginia (Fauquier & Loudown counties) and his wife, Margaret O'Connor of Ireland. They were prolific, as were their children. Many of their descendants are to be found in the Carolinas, Tennessee, Kentucky and Alabama. The Winn-Karnes Family of Washington Co., Ark., may be descendants of the Winns who were living in Green Co., Ky. as early as 1810 (perhaps earlier), as there were Winn-Bloyd families there at that time. Green Co., Ky. marriage records reflect the union of Barbara Winn, daughter of Thomas Winn, to Levi Bloyd Jan. 24, 1810. James Minor Winn of Washington Co., A rk. married a Nancy Bloyed, as stated in the Oct.1963 Flashback.

I think Sally was some relation to the Bradley in Ark. But get little response to my letters to people there. I am a gr-gr-gr-grandson of Crawford Goodwin who left will dated 1850 in Panola Co., Miss. One of his sons Bryant Goodwin settled in SE Ark. I have never found any of his Goodwin line who are working on the family genealogy; however, I have found descendants of other Goodwin lines in and around ElDorado, Ark.

The Dallas Library has thousands of valuable items, including (to name just a few): The American Genealogical Index (48 vols); DAR Magazine (95 vols including Master Index for Vols 1-85; DAC Lineage Books (4 vols); Guide to Manuscripts of Ky. Hist. Soc; Register of Ky Hist Soc (59 vols); Index to Goodspeed's Biographical Memorrs of Miss: Mayflower Descendants: Early Settlers of NY State (9 vols); NY genealogical & Biographical Record Subject Index (91 vols); Colonial & State Records of No. Carolina (30 vols incl 4 vols of Indexes; Chronicles of Okla. Index to Vols 1-37; Pennsylvania Magazine of History & Biography, Index to 75 vols; South Carolina Hist Mag, vols 1-62 indexed; East Tenn Hist Soc, 33 vols, the first 20 vols indexed: more Texas and Virginia items than we have room to name. The Arkansas Material in the Dallas genealogical collection includes: Index to seven Goodspeed histories of Arkansas, biographical material in a number of early Ark newspapers, and Nos. 13-16 of the Ark Hist Commission's Bulletin of Information.
