Some of these maps are black and white, while others are in brilliant color. It is a wonderful new Arkansas research resource. Check it out.

Heads up! The Arkansas Genealogical Society is now in the process of preparing a new Arkansas CD publication, this one an index to Arkansas naturalization records. The original compilation was created during the Great Depression, and published in a very limited edition just as the U. S. went into World War II. Consequently, it is one of Arkansas’s most difficult to locate genealogy sources. Our goal is to have it available for purchase at our upcoming fall genealogical conference.

THE LIFE OF MRS. VIRGINIA CABELL SPRING DUNLAP, ARKANSAS PIONEER

Virginia Cabell Spring Dunlap, who died April 4, 1936, in Winslow, Washington County, Arkansas, suffered many of the tragedies associated with life on the Arkansas frontier.¹ However, she survived them all and accomplished many good and lasting deeds during her some ninety years of life. Mrs. Dunlap was the widow of a Confederate veteran of the Civil War, Dr. Albert Dunlap, and is buried beside him in the tiny cemetery at St. Stephen’s Episcopal Church in Winslow, Arkansas.

Virginia was born in Bentonville, Benton County, Arkansas, on November 25, 1845, the daughter of Dr. Nicholas Spring and Virginia Ann Cabell Schoolfield Spring. Virginia was the youngest of six children and the only one to survive to adulthood. After her mother's death when she was but three weeks old, she was largely raised in the household of her uncle, Col. James Pinckney Spring, her father's brother, and his wife, Pocahontas Catherine Schoolfield Spring, her mother's sister. Virginia's family, who had lived in Virginia and Tennessee, relocated from the latter state to northwest Arkansas shortly before Virginia's birth. Included among this large group of pioneers were her grandparents, Capt. and Mrs. John Spring and Dr. and Mrs. Aaron Schoolfield, as well as her uncle, Dr. Nicholas Spring and his wife, their son, William Spring, and his father – in - law, John Smith.²

In 1845, shortly after their arrival in Bentonville, Dr. Aaron Schoolfield, Virginia's grandfather, died. He was of English descent and born in 1775 in Maryland. He later lived in Virginia. He was buried in the "George Wallace" Cemetery about one mile east of Bentonville. His wife then returned to Tennessee. Besides Mrs. Dunlap's mother and her grandfather Schoolfield, her grandmother Spring also died soon after coming to their new home. They were also buried in Bentonville.³ Her grandmother, Nancy (Moore) Spring, died about 1835 (sic). She had an ancestor who was "a first cousin of Robert Bruce."

Mrs. Dunlap's great grandfather, Lawrence Spring of Philadelphia, served in the American Revolution. His son, Capt. John Spring, served in the War of 1812. David Schoolfield, youngest child of her great grandfather, moved to Ohio and changed the spelling of his name of Scholfield,

Later, when her father married his second wife, Pauline G. Sutton, Mrs. Dunlap moved to Fort Smith to once again live with her uncle, James Pickney Spring and his wife, Pocahontas Schoolfield Spring. It was from here on Christmas Day 1861, that Virginia and several other family members, those who were not off fighting in the Confederate Army, fled the advancing Union Army. They ended up in Huntsville, Texas. It was later remembered that their flight was so urgent that they left the "family silver and china" sitting on the table. She often told stories of the "warm affection" that grew between her Uncle James and General Sam Houston. She recalled that it was at Houston's own request during the Civil War that he and her uncle be buried side by side at Huntsville.⁴

Mrs. Dunlap's father, Dr. Nicholas Spring, served for several years as the assistant surgeon for the U. S. military garrison at Fort Smith before resigning at the beginning of hostilities between the North and the South. During the war, he served as a surgeon in the Fourth Arkansas Confederate State Troops. He died on March 19, 1870, and was buried at Fort Smith.⁵ At the close of the war, Virginia and her aunt, Mrs. Spring, went to Shreveport, Louisiana, then to Holmes County, Mississippi, and in 1868 to Leavenworth, Kansas; their travels prompted by hopes of improving Mrs. Spring's health. However, it was to no avail and Mrs. Spring died in December of 1872. Afterwards, Virginia returned to Fort Smith.

Here on December 7, 1873, Virginia married Dr. Albert Dunlap, a colleague of her father. He was a Confederate veteran who had served as a surgeon in the Seventh Arkansas Regiment, Confederate Army.¹ In 1887, after a successful practice in Fort Smith, Dr. and Mrs. Dunlap left their old home and moved to Winslow in southern Washington County. Here they established a well - known health and summer resort atop the mountain at Mount Gaylor. After locating there, the Dunlaps helped organize a local public school. They also helped establish the St. Stephen Episcopal Church and Cemetery. Later Virginia founded the Helen Dunlap Memorial School for “Mountain Girls” at Winslow. It was operated for a number of years as an outreach of the Protestant Episcopal Church in Arkansas. Dr. Dunlap, who was born on December 8, 1828, died at Winslow on December 4, 1910.² In 1936, when Mrs. Dunlap followed him in death, she was some ninety years old.

According to Mrs. Dunlap’s biographer, Elisa Vaught, “Mr. and Mrs. Dunlap had no children of their own but they raised the children of Dr. Dunlap’s brother, Clint Dunlap, a girl and a boy, and a son of his sister who had married a Mr. J. P. Flynn ... later the Dunlaps did adopt a “granddaughter, “Helen Pearce Dunlap,” who died at a young age.³ One of their adopted daughters was Maud/Maude Dunlap Duncan (1873–1958), the well - known dean of Arkansas women journalists. She earned this honor by single – handedly publishing a rural newspaper founded by Dr. Dunlap, the *Winslow American*, at Winslow, for some fifty years.⁴

KITTRELL – SHUH – POLLITT – WOODSON FAMILY BIBLE

These family Bible records are taken from a Bible owned by the late Mrs. John B. (Adelia) Kittrell, Sr. of Augusta, Arkansas.¹ The Bible was printed in Hartford, Conn. in 1829. It contains “Family Record” pages, mounted newspaper clippings, and three loose pages of material relating to the Kittrell – Shuh – Pollitt – Woodson families. This transcription follows the original spellings in these records.²

Pollitt Family (also spelled Politt)

Samuel Prollitt son of George and Mary Pollitt departed this life August the 23 day of 1812 about three oclock in the afternoon.

Nancy Pollitt wife of Samuel departed this November the 21 of 1822 about nine oclock in the morning.

Thomas Pollitt was Born the 23 of August 1774

Nancy Pollitt a wife of Samuel was Born April the 19 of 1783

Littleton Pollitt was Borne March the 1 of 1800

Lueycia (?) Pollitt was Borne May the 4 1803 (?)

William Pollitt was Borne August the 18 of 1804

Mary Ann Pollitt was Borne July the 15 of 1807

Sharlotte Pollitt was Bornd April the 2 of 1810

Samuel James (?) Pollitt was Bornd Oct the 8 of 1812

This Bible also contained several mounted newspaper clippings pasted into its Family Record section:

- The first one is for Mrs. F. H. Kittrell and is dated March 26, 1926. The name of the newspaper is not given. Mrs. Kittrell was born in Madison, Indiana, July 29, 1849, and died March 26, 1926, in Augusta, Arkansas. She was seventy – seven when she died. Her maiden name was Mamie Shuh and she married Mr. Kittrell on January 12, 1870. She was survived by her husband, a son, Dr. E. L. Kittrell, one daughter, Mrs. Ed R. Woodson, and three grandchildren, Lenwood, Minnie Bonner, and Virginia Conner Kittrell.

- The second one is for Mr. F. H. Kittrell and is dated March 24, 1930. No newspaper name is given. Mr. Kittrell, who died at the age of eighty – four, was the father – in – law of E. R. Woodson and was buried in the Augusta, Arkansas, cemetery. He was survived Dr. E. L. Kittrell, a son, and Mrs. E. T. Woodson, a daughter. His paternal and maternal ancestors were from Kentucky and Middle Tennessee. They immigrated to Arkansas just before the Civil War, bringing with them two daughters and two sons, the daughters now deceased. The boys were F. H., twenty – four at the time, and John B. Kittrell. John B. served as Woodruff County, Arkansas, Sheriff and Collector. Mr. Kittrell was a “consistent” member of the Presbyterian Church.

WILLIE NELSON’S DEEP ARKANSAS ROOTS

One of America’s most iconic country music personalities is “the red – headed stranger,” Willie Nelson. Recently it was announced that his first new collection of songs in some eighteen years would soon be released. It is entitled *Band of Brothers*. On it, the eighty – one year old Nelson will continue his long - standing tradition of singing about exes, outlaws, and “break’in” all the rules. It will be classic Willie. Go to parade.com/nelson to hear a song before the collection goes on sale.³

Most Americans of a certain age know Willie well; few, however, are aware of his deep ancestral roots in Arkansas, especially the Ozark Mountain counties of Newton and Searcy. Although Willie was born in Texas, both of his parents were natives of Arkansas, as were most of his paternal and maternal ancestors. In fact, his Standridge ancestors were in Arkansas by 1831 or so.

THE NELSON FAMILY

Willie Hugh Nelson was born early in 1933 at the height of the Great Depression in the small Hill County, Texas, hamlet of Abbott. A search of the *Texas Birth Index 1903 – 1997*, identifies his parents as Ira Doyle Nelson and Myrle Marie Greenhaw.⁴ Both Ira and Myrle were originally from Pindall, a small mountain community south of Harrison, Arkansas, in the extreme northwestern corner of Searcy County. They were married on September 6, 1929.⁵ Almost immediately, the young couple followed Ira’s parents to Hill County, Texas, where they settled at Abbott.⁶ Ira Doyle Nelson, Willie’s father, was born near Pindell, on July 9, 1913, the son of Alfred W. Nelson and Nancy Smothers Nelson.⁷ Willies’ mother was also born near Pindell on May 3, 1913.⁸ Early in 1931, Ira and Myrle became the parents of their first child, a girl, Bobbie Lee Nelson, who became a well - known musician in her own right. Soon after Willie’s birth, his parents divorced and his father married Lorraine Moon. He died in Austin, Texas, on December 5, 1978.⁹ Willie’s mother later married Claude Sharpentine and still later Ken Harvey. She died on December 11, 1983, and in buried in Yakima, Washington.¹⁰

After the divorce of their parents, Willie and Bobbie grew up under the care of their Nelson grandparents in Hill County. Many members of the children's family were musical. Their Greenhaw grandfather was an expert banjo player, an uncle played the piano, and they all sang. The Nelson children themselves displayed musical talent from a young age. Bobbie learned to play the piano at five on a parlor pump organ.¹¹ Willie's Grandfather Nelson died early in February of 1940, leaving Willie and his sister in the care of their grandmother, Nancy Nelson. She died in Fort Worth, Texas, on November 9, 1979.¹²

Alfred W., also known as William A., Nelson, was born November 13, 1884, in Newton County, the son of Franklin "Frank" C. Nelson and his wife, Aprilla Ann "Prilly" Marshall Nelson.¹³ Franklin C. Nelson, also called Uncle Peck, was a blacksmith who was born on June 3, 1857, in Marion County, Arkansas, the son of Newton P. Nelson (1837 – 1900) and Amanda Midget (1840 – 1900).¹⁴ Franklin C. died August 18, 1934, in Newton County. Aprilla Ann Marshall Nelson was born January 21, 1858, in what is now Boone County, Arkansas. She died on February 20, 1929, in Newton County.¹⁵ Alfred Nelson's wife, Nancy "Nanie" Elizabeth Smothers Nelson, was born December 16, 1882, in Randolph County, Arkansas, the daughter of William Marion Smothers (1860 – 1942) and his first wife, Mary Elizabeth Rose Smothers (1860 – 1894).¹⁶

THE GREENHAW FAMILY

Myrle Greenhaw Nelson's parents were William Alex/Alic/Bill Greenhaw (1883 - 1945) and Bertha L. Reynolds (1885 – 1964). Although her name on their marriage certificate is given as "Bertha Randle," her obituary states that she was the daughter of James and Susan A. O'Daniel Reynolds.¹⁷ Her parents are listed on the 1900 census of Western Grove, Arkansas, under the last name "Rannels."¹⁸ Although James "Jim" and Susan Reynolds were married in Western Grove in Newton County on April 25, 1904, they obtained their marriage license in neighboring Boone County.¹⁹ William and Bertha Greenhaw are both buried in the Glencoe Cemetery near Pindell.²⁰

Bertha's father, James Reynolds, was born about 1867, in Newton County, the son of Samuel S. Reynolds, and his second wife, Elizabeth J. Shaddox Reynolds.¹ During the Civil War, Samuel S. Reynolds, who was born in Jackson County, Alabama, in 1833, served in the Second Arkansas Cavalry, Union Army. He later received a pension for his service. He died on September 7, 1901, and is buried in the Western Grove Cemetery in northeastern Newton County.²

Susan A. O'Daniel, Bertha's mother, was born in February of 1864, in Arkansas the daughter of William O'Daniel (1800 – 1881) and Nancy (1818 -). William and Nancy married about 1844. They became the parents of some eleven children.³ The O'Daniels settled in the Western Grove area before 1850, where they became prosperous landowners.⁴

William Alex Greenhaw was born March 18, 1885, also in Western Grove. He was the son of Daniel Gabriel Greenhaw, born April 25, 1856, in Tennessee.⁵ Daniel evidently married twice, with his second wife, Lucy Standridge, being William's mother. His first wife was reportedly Miss R. A. Crume whom he married on March 3, 1875, in Randolph County, Arkansas.⁶ She died soon afterwards. He married Lucy on June 12, 1879, and died on February 14, 1923.⁷

THE STANDRIDGE FAMILY

Lucy Standridge Greenhaw was born in June of 1861, in Richland Township, which is in the southeastern corner of Newton County. She died on May 10, 1923, soon after the death of her husband.⁸ She and Daniel are both buried in Newton County's Richland Cemetery.⁹ They were the parents of some eleven children, all of whom had blue eyes.¹⁰ Lucy Standridge was the daughter of Alexander Standridge (1826 – 1902). He was universally known as "Little Alex" to differentiate him from a number of other family members with the same name.¹¹

According to family sources, Little Alex married three times, 1) Eliza Ann also called “Mary Elizabeth,” 2) Louisa (Eliza) Jones, and 3) Jane Yates Taylor. Eliza Ann was evidently Lucy’s mother.¹² Little Alex was born January 30, 1826, in Marion County, Tennessee, and died June 22, 1902, in Newton County, Arkansas. Between 1847 and 1881, he became the father of some ten children.¹³ Little Alex and his family show up in tax records in old IZARD, later Carroll, County, Arkansas, as early as 1832.¹⁴ Later the entire clan moved south into southern Newton County¹⁵.

“Little Alex” was the son of Martin Standridge (1806 – 1884) and his wife Katherine. According to family Bible records, Martin was born on October 12, 1806. At the time, his family was living in old Franklin County, Georgia. He and Katherine were the parents of some nine children.¹⁶ Martin Sr. died on February 5, 1888, and is buried in Richland Cemetery near Pelsor, Arkansas.¹⁷

Martin Standridge was the son of Alexander Standridge and his wife, Elizabeth. She may have been an Owen.¹⁸ Little is known of the life of this Alexander except that he was born shortly before the American Revolution, perhaps in North Carolina. He first shows up in the 1800 U. S. Census in Pendleton District, South Carolina.¹⁹ The area is now in Pickens County. Shortly afterwards, his family moved west into old Franklin County, Georgia.²⁰ Before 1810, he settled in Marion County, Tennessee, where in 1821, he and his wife became charter members of one of the area’s first churches, the Union Primitive Baptist Church at Sweeden’s Cove.²¹ Still later, he and his family moved to Illinois for a short while before settling in northern Arkansas about 1831 or so. The area later became part of eastern Carroll County.²² He seems to have died there about 1835.²³

There is good evidence that Alexander Standridge, Martin’s father, was the son of Thomas “T.” Standridge, a veteran of the War of 1812, who died in Indiana early in 1835. Thomas may have been born as early as 1755.²⁴ In 1778, he appears to have received two land grants in what is now Alexander County, North Carolina. Shortly after the Revolutionary War, he moved to northwestern South Carolina, where he is listed in Pendleton County in the 1790 U. S. Census.²⁵ He then settled for a short while in Franklin County, Georgia, before immigrating to Indiana about 1810. Here he lived in Marion County and died in 1835.²⁶

Yes, although most of his fans do not know it, Willie Hugh Nelson’s family roots run deep in the soil of the Natural State. His Standridge Family was among the first settlers in northern Arkansas. He still has cousins scattered across the state, including the author of this article.

IMPLIED PROBATE, GUARDIANSHIP, AND ESTATE INFORMATION FOUND IN NEWTON COUNTY, ARKANSAS, TAX RECORDS 1850 - 1868

Northwest Arkansas’s Newton County was created in 1842 from parts of southern Carroll County. Many of its records were destroyed shortly after the Civil War, making it one of the more difficult counties in the northern part of the state to research. The following information relating estate information in Newton County was abstracted from existing county tax records for 1850 – 1868 located on MFILM County 003698, Roll 27 at the Arkansas History Commission. Many names are difficult to read and others are subject to a wide variety of spellings. A few appear more than once as the probate process proceeds. Parts of these records were incomplete, especially for 1867.

DUBLIN, LOGAN COUNTY, ARKANSAS, 1884

The following article appeared in the *Prairie View, Arkansas, Exchange*, on December 4, 1884, p. 3, col. 3 – 4, Arkansas History Commission Miscellaneous Roll No. 6, MFILM News, Roll 00706.

During the latter part of the nineteenth and the first part of the twentieth centuries, many communities across Arkansas had their own small weekly newspaper. The files of these publications, many of which are on microfilm at the Arkansas History Commission, are a rich source of local and family history information, as well as genealogical data. The small rural community of Dublin is located on Highway 197 east of the town of Scranton in Cane Creek Township, Logan County, Arkansas. Its post office was established in 1881 and continued to serve the area until 1917.¹ The local schoolteacher may have written this article.

“Dublin.

If you will give me a short space in your paper I will give you a meager description of the town of Dublin. It is situated on one of the most beautiful mounds of Logan county. The nice grove of oaks by which it is surrounded, makes it a most desirable place in the summer for the protection of the hot rays of sun, and in the autumn it gives evidence of the visitation of frost, and speaks, as it were, of the approaching winter. Dublin is inhabited by some of the hospitable, energetic and industrious people it has ever been our fortune to mingle with. They seem to be wide awake on the subject of education, which is proven by the fact that they support a good school from six to ten months in the year ...

The mercantile trade of this town is run by Esquire Ward, who was a citizen of this place long before the town commenced being built. He is a man whose integrity cannot be questioned. The milling and [cotton] ginning of this place is done by Creekmore and McNeal, who are doing a good business and giving general satisfaction to their customers. Mr. R. S. Carr is the postmaster at this place, and with one exception he can be called the ‘funny man of the lower end of the county.’ The blacksmithing is done by Messrs. Brown and Flinn, who do all kinds of work on short notice and give satisfaction.

Mr. George Williams, who was once a citizen of [the nearby community of] Prairie View, has concluded to cast his lot with the good citizens of Dublin. If you have any pistols, guns, etc., that need repairing, he will do it on short notice and at reasonable prices. Mr. Dan Maples is a resident of this place and a splendid farmer, and by the way, he was made happy Sunday before last by the arrival of a fine boy at this house. Although it [the baby] is not a democrat, he has concluded to [name it] Cleveland [after President Grover Cleveland]. More anon.”

A RARE LOVELY COUNTY, ARKANSAS, LEGAL DOCUMENT

Lovely County was a short - lived Arkansas county established on October 13, 1827. It encompassed the western parts of Crawford, Benton, and Washington counties and much of northeastern Oklahoma. However, on October 17, 1828, it was discontinued. Documents relating to Lovely County, as the one transcribed below, are among the rarest all of Arkansas legal documents. This power of attorney was found among the Gibson Family Papers located at the Arkansas History Commission, SMC, Box 54, No. 5, MG microfilm 00231. This transcription follows the original document; however, it is very difficult to read. Robert Bell and Richard Robinson were living in Crawford County in 1830.¹

*“[Arkansas Territory
County of Lovely]*

Know all men by these presents that Richard Robinson have constituted and appointed and as hereby constituted and appoint (sic) Robert Bell of the Territory of Arkansas for me and in my name, my true, lawful, & irrevocable attorney [who can] register my name with the agent for the Cherokee Indians, as a Claimant for two quarter Sections, or three hundred and twenty acres of land, to which I am entitled, by virtue of an Act of congress passed in May 1828, granting donations to a dual (sic) Settler in that part of the Territory of Arkansas which by said act of Congress has ceased to be a part of said territory.

Given under my hand and seal this 2nd day of February 1829

Personally came before me one of the subscribing witnesses to the within letter of Attorney and saith that he saw the same signed, sealed and delivered and that the same was done in good faith Sworn to by Subscribed (?).”²

1867 CARROLL COUNTY, ARKANSAS, VOTERS, AN ANNOTATED AND REVISED LIST

Recently the Arkansas Genealogical Society published a searchable CD database of a previously unavailable 1867 collection of the names of legal voters from twenty – five Arkansas counties. It represents a unique collection of name and location information for tens of thousands of Arkansas’s adult male citizens during this troubled time in our state’s history. This publication was compiled from a microfilm collection located at the Arkansas History Commission in Little Rock, Arkansas, roll number MG04632, entitled, “1867 Arkansas County Voters Lists.” This CD is available for purchase from AGS for \$15.00 plus postage and tax.

However, when we set about to transcribe the names for one of northwest Arkansas’s oldest counties, Carroll County, we found that the images on the microfilm were so faint that only a very small percentage of the names could be read. Therefore, our listing for this county was woefully inadequate. Fortunately, the original hardcopy manuscripts of these records are now available at the Arkansas History Commission. When we looked at the pages for Carroll County, it quickly became apparent that by using these newly available copies, most if not all of the original names could be transcribed. Pages one through two are missing and page three was damaged and is very difficult to read. Other pages are also very hard to read, especially for those of Hickory Township.

In this compilation, we have compared this voters’ list with the county’s 1867 tax records that are also on microfilm at the History Commission, MFILM County Roll 26, 000462. This has yielded some additional information on the spellings of names, residency information, etc. Note that many voter names do not appear on the tax records. Because of the politics of the time, some of the county’s Confederate veterans were denied permission to vote.

Carroll County was created in 1833 from the western part of Izard County. Later, parts or all of Madison, Newton, and Boone counties were created from it. By 1867, the county was divided into eleven townships: Carrollton, Osage, Liberty, Prairie, Kings River, Hickory, Long Creek, Jackson, Crooked Creek, Jefferson, and Sugar Loaf. The largest in number of voters was Jefferson with 214 and the smallest was Sugar Loaf with twelve. The old county courthouse at Carrollton burned early in 1870 and all early records were destroyed. Thus, research in this county can be very difficult.

In 1867, tax records show 776 Carroll County men assessed for the poll tax. This tax applied to all males in the county between the ages of twenty – one and sixty. Women were not assessed a poll tax. The 1867 voter registration board listed a total of 919 voters, plus one voter whose name was “erased,” and 112 whose names are missing.¹ Several of the voters were listed on the tax records as “non – residents” and one is listed as “deceased.” These names are subject to a wide variety of spellings. Page numbers on this list are not consecutive.

These voter records, consisting of nineteen pages, contain the name of the voter, a sequential number assigned to him, and the name of his township of residence. The original order of the names is preserved in order to show the “neighbor” order of the voters. For additional information on the location of Carroll County townships, see Russell P. THE LIFE OF COLONEL SAMUEL ROBERT MEREDITH OF SEVIER COUNTY, ARKANSAS

This biography information of Civil War veteran, Colonel Samuel Robert Meredith, is taken from an article written by his son – in – law, E. E. Cochran and published in the DeQueen, Arkansas, *DeQueen Bee*, August 20, 1920, p. 6, col. 6 on microfilm at the Arkansas History Commission in Little Rock, MFILM News 000130, Roll 7. This transcription follows the original article’s punctuation.

“Colonel Samuel Robert Meredith was born at Tuscumbia, Alabama, October, 1845 ... and died in a pasture on his farm at Ben Lomond [Sevier County], Arkansas, on August the 3rd. 1920, from injuries inflicted upon him by a vicious Holstein bull ...

The father of Colonel Meredith died during his early childhood and was survived by his widow, his son, Colonel Meredith, and several daughters. In the early [Eighteen] Sixties when the Civil War began, [the Colonel] who was not yet 16 years of age, ran away from home and joined the confederate army and became a member of the Forrest Cavalry corps, where he served during the remainder of the war. When the war closed he found himself penniless ... his father’s plantation was confiscated, and the family silver had been stolen. Not only was he ruined financially, but he was charged with the duty and responsibility of supporting his widowed mother, his youngest sister and several orphaned nieces and nephews. [He] cheerfully assumed the burden of the head of the family. He supported his mother in comfort during the remainder of her life and reared and educated his younger sisters and nieces and nephews.

Just after the war Colonel Meredith moved to Arkansas and settled near Washington, Hempstead county. He was married to Miss Mary Cornelia Tolland in March, 1879 ... his wife and five children survive him, viz:

John R. Meredith, Wilton, Arkansas.

Huter Meredith, Horatio, Ark.

Chester Meredith, Ben Lomond, Ark.

Mrs. E. E. Cochran, wife of writer, Idabel, Okla.

Mrs. H. C. Perkins, Idabel, Okla.

He was indeed a true gentleman in every sense of the word. He loved the South for it was his own native land. He loved its history, its literature, its songs, legends and traditions, its people, its sunshine, its birds and its flowers ... He was an old school Presbyterian and had been a member of this church since young manhood. He had never been an active member because he had never lived close by a church of his choice but he clung steadfastly to the faith of his fathers ...

Colonel Meredith had one affliction that was a great worry to him and that was he was almost totally deaf and his deafness, no doubt, was the cause of his death for he was unable to hear the rush of the brute that struck him down. But aside from his deafness he was remarkably active and well preserved for a man of his advanced years. ... [He] loved his family, his wife and his children, his grandchildren, his sons – in – law and they all returned his affection and respected and revered him for the man he was ... His deafness was a sore affliction and must have caused him such sorrow for it was difficult to talk to him and he liked to talk but he consoled himself by reading The old gentleman was a good citizen and stood for all that was best in politics and government ... some two years ago while our country was at war [World War I] ... he purchased a large American flag and with his own hands erected a tall flag pole in his front yard ... and he invited his friends and neighbors to come to his home and assist in raising the flag ... when they were all assembled ... this old Confederate Soldier made them a short speech. ‘Many years ago I dedicated some four years of my life in an effort to tear down that flag but now after a lapse of more than 50 years, I am glad to say that this is my Country and this is my flag ... I have one grandson and several grand- nephews wearing the uniform of this Republic and fighting under that flag to keep it flying in honor, both on land and sea’ ... [He was buried the next day] in the gray uniform of a Confederate officer, which he loved so well ...”

1940 RED HILL, CRAWFORD COUNTY, SUNDAY SCHOOL HOMECOMING

This story of a Sunday School “Homecoming” and reunion was published in the Van Buren, Arkansas, *Press – Argus* on August 16, 1940, p. 1, col. 2, MFILM News 000673, Roll 6. At the time, the Red Hill Community was located about one mile northeast of the Cain Community on State Highway 348 east of Mountainburg, Crawford County, Arkansas.¹

“The fifty – fth annual homecoming [of the Red Hill Sunday School, organized in 1885] will be held Aug. 18 at Red Hill, two miles west [east] of Mountainburg [Crawford County, Arkansas] on Locke road, Ben Vaught, [is] chairman of the program committee ...

[The] election of officers is scheduled for 1 p. m. Present officers are J. T. Teague, president; Luther Creekmore, Vice president; L. M. Meadors, secretary.

The [reunion] program will open at 9:30 a. m., with singing, “When the Roll is Called Up Yonder,” will be the first hymn. The invocation will be by Vaught. Old Time songs then will be led by J. L. Teaguejacl, until 10:30 o’clock, when an address will be given by J. H. Dodson, superintendent of the Richland, Okla., school.

There will be singing by classes until noon, when a picnic lunch will be served in the shade of the trees. Election of officers is scheduled at 1 o’clock, followed by singing. At 2 p. m., G. C. Smith of Fayetteville, will talk. Other addresses are scheduled by Judge J. L. Smith, Van Buren, and Roy Gean, Fort Smith.

In 1939, 11 of the 47 original charter members of the non – denominational Sunday School, organized at Red Hill 54 years ago, were present. [A total of] more than 1,000 persons were present [then], representing eight states.”

**PUPILS OF SULPHUR SPRING SCHOOL
DISTRICT NO. 25,
MONTGOMERY COUNTY, ARKANSAS, 1908**

This list of school students was published 1908 in a small pamphlet by rural schoolteacher, Alice M. Seidner. She taught in the Sulphur Spring School District that was located in Big Fork Township, in the mountains of western Montgomery County Arkansas. This community is located north of Highway No. 8 between Norman and Mena. Its post office was once called Alf. It is likely that Alice was the only teacher in the district's one room schoolhouse. Note the reoccurring family names among the students indicating the large sizes of rural families at the time. Many of the students were also interrelated, as was also typical in rural societies. The school district and its building are now long since vanished.

MADISON COUNTY “MERCHANDISE,” 1861

The unusual information listed below for Madison County, Arkansas, merchants and businessmen, called here “merchandise”, was found on the microfilm of the 1861 Madison County Tax Record Book, Roll 20 MFILM County 003351 at the Arkansas History Commission in Little Rock. It was originally compiled by Elijah Drake the county sheriff and tax collector as part of his assessment of county taxes at the beginning of the Civil War. It was evidently a supplement to the regular tax assessments. The last two columns seem to refer to “value of goods” and the value of “money loaned at interest.” It is thought that all of those listed here lived in the county through some seem to also have had business interests outside of the county. Those noted as “Foreign” may have operated businesses outside of the Confederate States, which is in the United State. The one noted as “State” probable operated in a neighbor county.

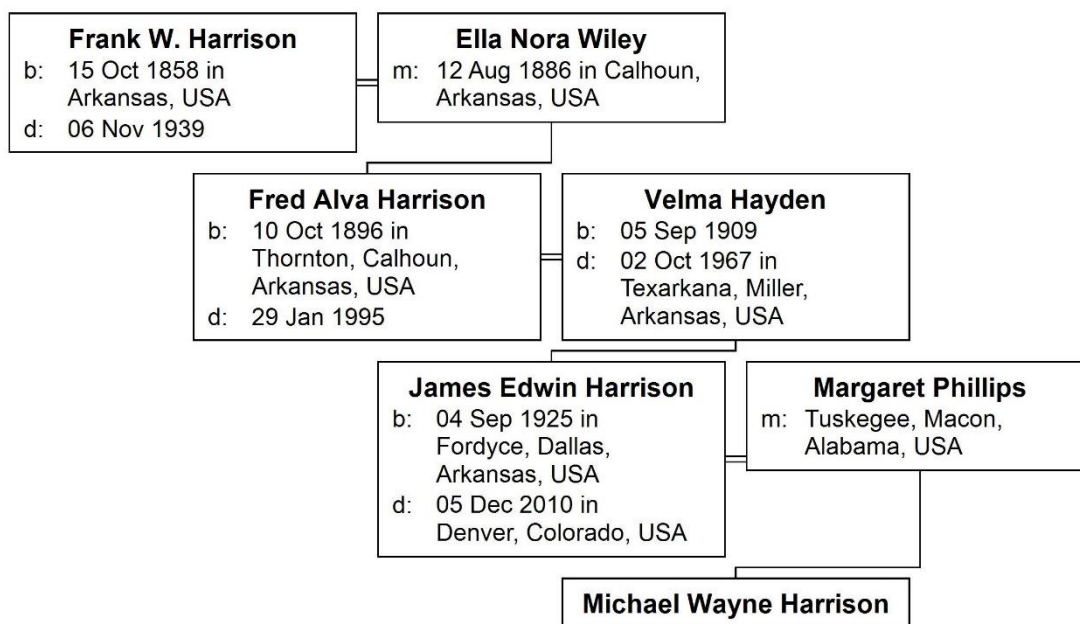

Do you have ancestors who resided in Arkansas or had an Arkansas Civil War service or pension? AGS offers certificates in five different categories of residency. In which category does your ancestor belong? A little research will qualify you for a certificate giving recognition to your family's pioneers and settlers of Arkansas. The categories are:

Colonial

This certificate is for an ancestor who resided in Arkansas prior to 1 January 1804.

Territorial

This certificate is for an ancestor who resided in Arkansas prior to 15 June 1836.

Antebellum

This certificate is for an ancestor who resided in Arkansas prior to 6 May 1861.

Nineteenth Century

This certificate is for an ancestor who resided in Arkansas prior to 31 December 1900.

Civil War Ancestry

This certificate is for an ancestor who served in an Arkansas Union or Confederate unit between 1861 and 1865, or applied for an Arkansas Confederate pension, or whose widow applied for such pension, or a Union soldier or soldier's widow who applied for a U.S. pension while residing in Arkansas.

To prove ancestry in Arkansas, a lineage of the direct ancestor must be submitted to AGS along with source documents to prove these facts. A family group sheet of the ancestor who resided in Arkansas must be completed with primary sources as proof. All sources must be cited, photocopied, and submitted with the application. Examples of acceptable documents include census records, church or Bible records, tax lists, court records, military records, land patents, deeds, newspaper items, Civil War service record, or Arkansas Confederate or U.S. pension record. Applications will be filmed by the Arkansas History Commission. Print the application from the AGS website at www.agsgenealogy.org or write to AGS, PO Box 26374, Little Rock, AR 72221 and send your address with \$1.00 for postage. Complete the application form and return it to AGS with a \$10.00 fee.
