Oakland and Fraternal Historic Cemetery Celebrates 160 Years (1863-2023)



On Sunday, November 5, 2023, 2-5 pm **Oakland and Fraternal Historic Cemetery Park** will be celebrating 160 years of its rich history. Please come on out and celebrate with us. We will have tours of the cemetery and mausoleum, music, information, and research assistance. We will welcome Mayor Scott to dedicate a bridge and a National Register of Historic Places Plaque.

In the early 1860s, a need arose in Little Rock for an additional cemetery. There were public health concerns regarding more burials in the city limits, and Mount Holly, established in 1843, was becoming overcrowded. The large number of soldiers' burials in Little Rock during the Civil War called for more burial space for both Confederate and Union dead. Oakland-Fraternal Cemetery now has 63 acres with 14 family mausolea, a 290-crypt public mausoleum, and over 60,000 monuments and sculptures.

Oakland and Fraternal Historic Cemetery Cont.





In 1862 the city paid \$5,000 for the 160-acre Starbuck Estate of William Woodruff, Jane Woodruff, and Mary Starbuck for a new cemetery. It was called **Oakland** because it was in a wooded area outside the city limits on the old "Pine Bluff Dirt Road. By 1877 it was Little Rock's City Cemetery. The next year, Union troops established an encampment in the cemetery and buried their dead there. In 1866, the US Government bought 32 acres of land from Oakland Cemetery and established **Little Rock National Cemetery** to relocate the remains of Union soldiers from across the state to a more central location.

In 1874 the Jewish Congregation **B'nai Israel** purchased land at Oakland for their cemetery, many burials from the Jewish section at Mount Holly were reinterred at Oakland Jewish Cemetery. In 1902 the Jewish Orthodox community **Agudath Achim** purchased land adjacent to B'nai Israel Cemetery for its own cemetery.





In 1913 the **11-acre Confederate cemetery** was incorporated into the national cemetery. It holds the graves of 1,797 confederate burials. A **one-acre Confederate Cemetery** at the northeast corner of National Cemetery is called Confederate Cemetery and holds a mass grave of approximately 900 Confederate soldiers. It holds the remains of 640 Confederate soldiers who were reinterred to this area from Mount Holly Cemetery in 1884. The gravesite is marked with an 18-foot granite obelisk erected in 1913 and listed on the National Register of Historic places as Little Rock Confederate Memorial (1996).

Oakland and Fraternal Historic Cemetery Cont.

In 1888, the Grand United Order of Odd Fellows and some other African-American fraternal orders led by the Grand United Order of Odd Fellows were granted 14 acres by the city. In 1893, this cemetery was titled **Fraternal Cemetery**. A granite marker was placed in the cemetery which read, "Free American Citizens." Fraternal Cemetery saw the burials of distinguished members of the Black community that had grown and prospered in Little Rock following the Civil War. In 1975, and the cemeteries were combined and renamed Oakland and Fraternal Historic Cemetery Park.

The Oakland Mausoleum was built in 1919 by the Southwestern Mausoleum Company and Cecil Bryan who designed and sold mausolea nationwide. The Oakland and Fraternal Historic Cemetery Park is city-owned and managed by a City Board of Directors and a Sexton, John Rains.

Friends of Oakland and Fraternal Historic Cemetery Park was founded in 2022. This non-profit corporation is devoted to the preservation and maintenance of Oakland and

Fraternal Historic Cemetery and Park. Our purpose is to raise awareness of the historic nature of the cemetery by providing financial and community support, education, and engaging community and family involvement.
