

## **Arkansas Ancestry Certificates**



The Arkansas Genealogical Society issues Certificates of Arkansas Ancestry to qualified researchers. Since January 1991, we have issued approximately 450 certificates. Everyone with early Arkansas roots is encouraged to apply.

Types of certificates include:

Colonial Certificates – For ancestors who resided in Arkansas prior to 1 January 1804.

Territorial Certificates – For ancestors who resided in Arkansas prior to 15 June 1836.

Antebellum Certificates – For ancestors who resided in Arkansas prior to 6 May 1861.

Civil War Certificates – For ancestors who served in a Confederate or Union Arkansas unit between 1861 and 1865, or applied for an Arkansas Confederate pension, or whose widow applied for such a pension, or a Union soldier or a soldier's widow who applied for a U.S. pension while living in Arkansas.

Nineteenth Century Certificates – For ancestors who resided in Arkansas prior to 31 December 1900.

These lineages are published in The Arkansas Family Historian. A copy of the applications along with the accompanying proof documents are archived and filmed at the Arkansas State Archives.
